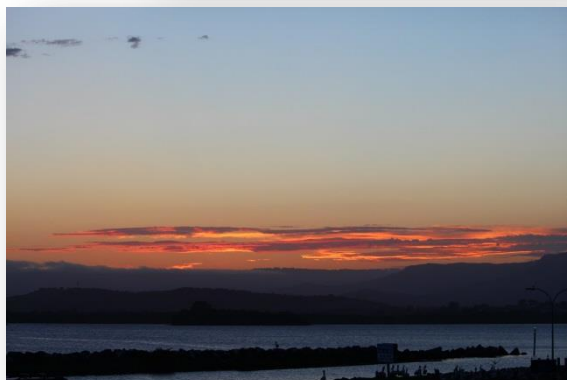

Stars of future shine at regatta

AFTER thriving in the same strong, southerly winds as the Sydney to Hobart entrants, the next generation of Australian sailing champions showed its impressive potential up Lake Hawarra yesterday.
Almost all of the four day national regatta include Olympic medalists. Malcolm Page, Nathan Wainwright and two-time America's Cup-winning skipper James Spill and Port Kembla's Hugh Lewis said spectators got a glimpse of sailing's future champions.
"It was fantastic regatta," Lewis, a Manly national junior titles event epicurean, said.
"The strong southerly that affected the Sydney to Hobart came through on Sunday morning and that presented a lot of challenges for the kids but we saw some real standout little sailors."
"The pair who won the spinnaker from Manly on Shogun, Zac Barnabas and Oscar Engle, are names to watch for the future," Lewis said the 14 Port

kids it was their first ever nationals and we had a number of podium finishes across the four days."
"Stations Felicity and Isabelle Carlson led the charge aboard Quack, finishing third overall in the novice class."
"Erin Curry and Tylan Walsh got a fifth and Emmett Walsh and Riley Curry got a sixth in the opens against very tough competition, so they're tapping on the door of some of the really good Sydney boys," Lewis said.
"Jacina Oliveri and Maddison Markey a second and a third in the novice and Cirsta Kelly and Alannah Lewis got a fifth."
"Guys like Dylan Carbone, Connor Carlson, Elliot Wain, Michael Markey, Connor Ware and Bailey Sellers all built on every race and came in leaps and bounds."

MANLY JUNIORS

BRIAN WELDON, from Mosman, NSW, pulled off a kind of lottery by sailing a borrowed boat to victory in the 1972 MJ Australian championships. The boat he borrowed, Kylie Tri, was raffled after the series, being won by Bryan Fryer of Concord Ryde. While Concord did not win the championship, the club ended up with the champion boat. Which is a strange twist to a well run series which was plagued by shocking weather.

It was a triumph for Mosman SC with 1st and 3rd (Trevor Date, Bampi) and a credit to the Avalon Sailing Club and the NSW MJ Assn. Better organisation or a happier family atmosphere would be hard to find. The boys and girls sailed in harmony with no serious incidents or protests, a credit to their parents and clubs.

The series was evenly contested with four different heat winners from five races. Varying conditions from six knots to 35 knots and heavy rain saw leaders come and go.

NSW champion, Mark Nash (Greenwich) was unbeatable in the light stuff sailing Oracle. Kylie Tri was best in the heavy, with Ulinga (Alan Broadbent, Concord Ryde) and Bampi the medium weather men. Shubbel (Robert Douglas, Balmoral) and Kaos (Paul Bergamini, Manly) were most consistent overall.

Unlucky boat was Two-Up, Robert Holdom, Manly, with two broken masts and Peanuts, Tim Baker, Manly, with capsizes when leading.

The 1972 champion, Brian Weldon, is 15, weighs 7 stone 13 lb and crew John Erickssen is 5 stone 10 lb. This crew's experience and weight triumphed in the heavy weather. Brian, third last year in Perth, had retired from sailing, but was conned into the series to sail and tune Kylie Tri, MJ 1988, which was built to advertise the class at the 1971 Sydney Boat Show. After the titles, Brian drew the winning ticket which gave Concord Ryde moral victory.

Runner up, Alan Broadbent (from Concord Ryde!) sailed consistently and more will be heard of him in the future.

Western Australia's three representatives from the Perth Flying Squadron did best in the lighter races. Hustler, Graham Brown, 14th overall and Ric Randall, Kylie Too, 22nd, did well against the top NSW boats. Ric is 11 and should be the top MJ skipper in the West next year. Third visitor, Mark Lewis (Woodstock) suffered from gear failures.

Tip for intending champions: best crew weight appears to be around 11 stone total — yet heavier, older, more experienced skippers still win when it blows.

Shocking conditions blot out the Manly Junior fleet at Avalon, Pittwater, NSW. Swims were common — and the rain kept falling.

MJ 1469 'Bampi' (aboriginal name for timber) was built by Marcell Roche for \$500.00 who was building all the Wilmots Flying Ants at the time. He was a slow but perfectionist builder who constructed the rudder and centreboard of timber with fibreglass coating which was rejected by the measurer of the time. No fibreglass was allowed and therefore Marcell had to be remake the foils, he was not happy as he insisted that the MJ class move forward and accept progress. We sold 'Bampi' to sailing sisters of the Greenwich SC.

The success of the Mosman fleet was due to the efforts of David Treglown (OK dinghy sailor) and Penny Rose who ran junior sailing courses out of Mosman Amateur Sailing Club in Mosman Bay. They were supported greatly by Gary Stephens (MASC starter and ex President of YA) and Bruce and Annetia Wallace who had a old yacht called 'Betty' and they towed us all around Sydney Harbour to Zone Championships at Vacluse and Woollahra. We lived on Cremorne Point and my Father was a member of the Cremorne Point Liberal Party and was told to bring his boys down to Mosman Bay for sailing lessons so for my ninth birthday present I was made a junior member of the MASC together with my younger brother Warwick, our first MJ was a club boat called 'Jomica' MJ404, the rest is history. Mosman produced some great MJ sailors as in Bruce & Rick Gosper (they lived and parents ran the Mosman Marina), Miltons, Wallace Family, Schloeffels, Craig Butters, Johnsons, Greens girls, Erickssens. The Weldons decided to race there MJ at Mosman due to high standard of racing and then won the Nationals at Avalon SC that year. I continued on at Mosman progressing to Lightweight Sharpies and I am still sailing Sharpies today in Mandurah WA and this Christmas in the Sharpie Nationals in Perth at Mounts Bay Sailing Club.

Daines adds yet another in sprint

Manly Lifesaving Club member, Doug Daines, maintained the club's record this season by winning the beach sprint at the open carnival held at Wanda Beach on Saturday.

This season Manly sprinters have won every race.

They have dominated the results by having at least two runners in the final three.

At Avalon's open carnival, Manly sprinters took the three places.

Daines, selected in the Manly-Warringah Branch team to compete at Woomona, Wollongong, on February 5, beat Sydney Branch representative, Ian Goode, of Cronulla.

Manly sprinter, Frank Collins, was placed third.

Frank Collins, a member of the Manly beach relay team of 1965, who won the Australian title in Perth, was runner-up in Adelaide in 1966, and again in Hobart, 1968, is making a successful return to sprinting.

Daines and Collins joined Davis and John Bird to be placed fourth in the final of the beach relay, behind Cronulla, Goode and North Cronulla teams.

Manly surf boat crews maintained their record too.

The junior crew, which has been in every final so far this season at open carnivals, was unlucky to be placed fourth in the final at Wanda, while the senior A crew was placed fifth in its final.

On Friday night at 7.30 p.m. at the club house, members of the Manly club will hold an official send-off to Paul Burke, Australian and international beach sprint champion.

He leaves soon with the Australian team to tour New Zealand.
